



VACCINATIONS

The primary diseases that dogs are routinely vaccinated against are:

C3 Vaccine

Parvovirus is highly contagious and attacks the gastrointestinal tract of puppies and dogs, especially in pups and dogs under 2 years.

- Lethargy
- Loss of appetite
- Fever
- Vomiting
- Severe, and often bloody diarrhoea

Distemper: is a highly contagious, often fatal disease caused by a virus that attacks the respiratory, gastrointestinal, and the nervous systems.

- Seizures, loss of balance, blindness
- Fever
- Nasal discharge
- Coughing
- Vomiting
- Diarrhoea

Hepatitis: is a highly contagious viral infection that affects the liver, kidneys, spleen, lungs, and eyes.

- Fever
- Lethargy
- Abdominal pain
- Vomiting
- Diarrhoea

C4 Vaccine

Parainfluenza: is the viral component of 'Canine Cough' is a highly contagious respiratory virus.

- Coughing (dry or moist)
- Low-grade fever
- Nasal discharge
- Lack of energy
- Loss of appetite

C5 Vaccine

Bordetella bronchiseptica: bacterial component of the cough and is a highly contagious respiratory disease. It causes [inflammation](#) of the trachea and bronchi.

- Dry, hacking cough
- Retching
- Sneezing
- Watery nasal discharge
- Pneumonia
- In-appetence
- Fever
- Lethargy in severe cases

The primary diseases that cats are routinely vaccinated against are:

F3 Vaccine

Enteritis: This virus affects the rapidly dividing blood cells in the body, primarily the cells in the intestinal tract, bone marrow, and in the stem cells of the developing fetus. Primarily in unvaccinated kittens between 3 and 5 months of age.

- Fever
- Vomiting
- Diarrhoea
- Liver failure and even sudden death

Calici Virus: part of the cat flu complex.

- Sneezing
- Conjunctivitis
- Ulcers on the gums and tongue

Rhinotracheitis: part of the cat flu complex.

- Sneezing
- Depression
- Conjunctivitis
- In-appetence
- Can lead to permanent nasal and sinus infection
